Dinah O'Brien – Domestic Violence Awareness

There is a significant correlation between domestic violence and human trafficking. Similar to domestic violence, both labor and sex trafficking use force, fraud or coercion to manipulate victims. And many of the factors present in an abusive relationship - such as the perpetrator using isolation, intimidation and their own privilege to harm the victim - also exist in trafficking.

Human trafficking is one of the largest criminal industries in the world, and victims of sexual abuse are at higher risk for being trafficked. Keep informed, stay alert, and if something seems wrong to you, please report it. We all need to stay educated on these subjects - they are both growing exponentially and must be stopped.

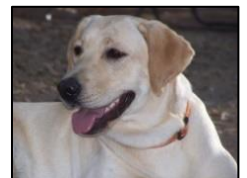

Asian Comics: Evolution of an Art Form

This is the largest ever selection of original artworks from Asian comics, displayed alongside their printed, mass-produced forms. This exhibition is a vivid journey through the art of comics and visual storytelling across Asia. From its historical roots to the most recent digital innovations, the exhibition looks to popular Japanese manga and beyond – highlighting key creators, characters and traditional graphic narrative artforms from countries including India, Philippines, Indonesia, China, Korea and Japan.

Sacred Realms: Buddhist Paintings by Shashi Dhoj Tulachan

The nine immense paintings shown in this exhibition are all the work of one extraordinary Buddhist monk named Shashi Dhoj Tulachan, a second-generation thangka artist living in Tuksche, a remote village located in Mustang, Nepal’s northernmost district adjacent to Tibet. This artist has devoted much of his life to the restoration of a nearby 16th century gumpa (Tibetan monastery) known as the Chhairo Gumpa. The practice of thangka painting is centuries old and is an art carried out by highly-trained monks for the purpose of teaching about Buddha and the tenets of the Buddhist religion.
